The Task Force has raised the question of the interpretation of the term "Mechanical transport" as used in Sec. 4(a) of the Act.

The following definition represents one school of thought of the Task Force:

"A contrivance for moving personnel or material over land or water; without power or propulsion other than from a living source. Includes horse drawn wagons, bicycles, nonmotorized duffel carriers, pedal propelled water machines and rowboats."

The other school of thought is that the term is nearly interchangeable with "motorized equipment" but somewhat broader:

"Mechanical transport as used in this title includes any contrivance which travels over ground or water on wheels, tracks, skids, or by floatation and is propelled by a non-living power source contained or carried on or within the device."

Your interpretation will be appreciated. The major difference in these two definitions is that the first would not allow the use of such vehicles as bicycles, horse drawn wagons, non-motorized duffel carriers, pedal propelled water machines and rowboats. The second definition would allow these items to be used in wilderness.
